Ichishkíin 101 – Fall 2013

Páxaat Sapálwit: This week, we'll be talking about our daily schedules and the things we do.

We'll also look at an additional verb tense that indicates things done regularly or habitually.

On Thursday or Friday, you are going to present your daily routine to the class, choosing 5-6 things you do in a typical weekday and telling us when you do them. Like your introduction from last week, this is a spoken presentation, not a reading. You need to have at least three pictures as well to show your fellow students as you speak – these can be of you or anyone else.

Mish mash wa wiyáxayxt? What are your days like?

Last week, we looked at verbs with *-sha*. This indicates an ongoing action – similar to the English suffix –ing:

tkw'anátisha	'walking'
Tkw'anátishaash	'I'm walking'
Tkw'anátishaam	'you are walking?'
Itkw'anátisha	's/he's walking'

The suffix $-\underline{x}a / -\underline{n}\underline{x}a / -\underline{i}\underline{n}\underline{x}a$ indicates that something is done habitually or regularly. (For now, memorize the whole word and don't focus on the variation between $-\underline{x}a$, $\underline{n}\underline{x}a$ and $-\underline{i}\underline{n}\underline{x}a$.)

1. Here are a few things we do during the day:

Máytkwata <u>x</u> aash.	I eat breakfast.
Kútkut i n <u>x</u> aash.	I work.
Skúuli <u>x</u> aash.	I go to school.
Wíwanikin <u>x</u> aash.	I read/study.
Áksisaysi <u>x</u> aash.	I exercise.
Aní <u>x</u> aash tkwátat.	I make dinner.
Pnúwata <u>x</u> aash.	I go to bed.

And here are the verbs in the sentences above:

2. Asking about your day:

Mish nam skúuli <u>x</u> a?	Do you go to school?
Ii, skúuli <u>x</u> aash.	Yes, I go to school.
Mish nam?	Do you?
Mɨnán nam kútkutɨn <u>x</u> a?	Where do you work?
Kútkut i n <u>x</u> aash Eugenepa.	I work in Eugene.

What do you do on the weekend? (This is a bit different than just Sunday)

Shap'áwi <u>x</u> aash.	I play ball.
Pnún <u>x</u> aash.	I sleep. (This is different from 'I go to bed'!)
Ápikchaashi <u>x</u> aash patún.	I take pictures of things.
Wanpáwaasi <u>x</u> aash.	I play music.
Twátima <u>x</u> aash.	I draw.
Wíwanik i n <u>x</u> aash.	I read/study.
Palyúu <u>x</u> aash.	I play stick game.
Tkwaníntkwanin <u>x</u> aash ámchnik.	I walk outside.
Twátima <u>x</u> aash hawláak timatpamápa.	I do things on the computer.

5. Here are some other things to do during the day:

Winaníi <u>x</u> aash.	I bathe.
Íi <u>x</u> inxaash i t í t.	I brush my teeth.
Táatpasi <u>x</u> aash.	I get dressed.
Sitkumsáani <u>x</u> aash skúulitpa.	I eat lunch at school.
Tú <u>x</u> in <u>x</u> aash iníityaw.	I go back home.
Náktkwanin <u>x</u> aash miyánashma.	I take care of my children.
Alátk'in <u>x</u> aash shapátk'inan.	I watch TV.
